

Agricultural Extension in South Asia (AESA) organized webinars and published several outputs during April-September 2020.

COVID-19 & EAS

AESA created a dedicated section on COVID-19 & EAS on its website for showcasing the role played by Extension and Advisory Services (EAS) in supporting farmers to adapt to COVID-19. Farmers faced many challenges in accessing input and output markets, and harvesting and transporting their produce during the lockdown imposed to contain the spread of COVID-19. AESA published 24 blogs and 12 Field Notes – specifically on how EAS responded to these issues.



AESA participated in the webinar on mitigating the impact of COVID-19 on the agricultural value chain co-organised by Value Chain Capacity Building Network (VCB-N) in collaboration with Global Forum for Rural Advisory Services (GFRAS), IFAD, Helvetas and Hivos on 15 May 2020. AESA also participated in a webinar co-organised by FAO's Research and Extension Unit in collaboration with GFRAS to discuss the role of EAS in the context of the pandemic in Asia on 19 May 2020, and shared experiences from South Asia.

Students Come to the Rescue of Farmers Affected by COVID-19

In Bangladesh the lockdown due to COVID-19 spread has disrupted the agricultural value chains. Though there are some relaxations in the lockdown guidelines for agriculture, lack of sufficient labour and machineries impacted paddy harvesting. In this situation, the students of different Universities, Colleges and Schools of Bangladesh have come forward to support farmers.

In Sherpur, a truly highlighted and praiseworthy step is the formation of a voluntary forum with some enthusiastic students naming, "Student Community Policing Forum". The initiative of the forum was taken by Bangladesh Police and also are being supervised by them. At present 300 volunteers are active in this forum. They have also taken part in harvesting activities. They have harvested around 10 acres of land with 50 volunteers working daily for one week.

Ms. Nishat Salsabil Khan from Bangladesh received the first prize in the youth category in the GFRAS-Young Professionals for Agricultural Development (YPARD) Competition on Coping with COVID-19: Stories from the Field. AESA supported this competition by forming a committee for promoting the competition, screening the entries from Bangladesh, and selecting the winners.
